
FISCAL YEAR HIGHLIGHTS

Northern Human Services Changing Lives

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

- Two Carroll County community mental health center locations in Conway and Wolfeboro worked collaboratively with the Center for Life Management, to pilot a new program, Continuum of Collaborative Care, which bridges services between mental health and developmental disabilities and ensures that clients with a dual diagnosis receive the services they need.
- The Berlin **Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) Team**, which provides a full range of services to people who have been diagnosed with a serious mental illness, was identified as having one of the most efficient and stable ACT teams at Northern Human Services. The team was formally recognized by the State of Hampshire.
- Berlin Mental Health Center staff engaged with the Gorham Middle & High School. A NHS mental health case manager is onsite and working with students two half days each week.
- Jennifer Wackerle, LICSW and Jaime-Rose Kelly, LCMHC attended a Parent Resource Night on cyber bullying and suicide at Lin-Wood School in Lincoln, NH. They provided a resource table for parents and community members that included support and information about where to turn in a mental health crisis.
- **Michele Authier**, LICSW provided a 1.5-hour training for teachers and staff at White Mountains Regional High School during their teacher in-service day. Michele provided the attendees with an overview of trauma and an introduction to Dialectical Behavior Therapy.
- White Mountain Mental Health (WMMH) worked collaboratively with the School Administrative Unit 36 (SAU 36) to provide services to students who are not currently receiving services through the community mental health centers. Funds from the State of New Hampshire Department of Education were allocated to provide mental health services to summer camp staff and student campers in SAU 36 that were not receiving services through Northern Human Services. A WMMH children's care coordinator collaborated with an SAU 36 social worker to provide specialized small group programming to support students with social skill development and emotional regulation. Students practiced their new skills though game play and creating a feelings books for use in the classroom and at home.

PARTICIPANT DIRECTED & MANAGED SERVICES / IN HOME SUPPORTS

- Hosted two events for families, our first since Covid-19; an apple-picking day at a local orchard, which included cider and donuts, a visit to the petting zoo, and plenty of time in-person socializing.
- December brought back our holiday luncheon held for the first time in Conway. Nearly 50 families enjoyed a bountiful meal, dessert, bingo, singing, and holiday cheer.

RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

Hospital Road Residence in Colebrook, enjoyed a Luau-themed event with fun summer drinks, Hawaiian pizza, pineapple upside down cake. Residents also enjoyed listening to Hawaiian music and learning about Hawaiian culture.

FAMILY-CENTERED EARLY SUPPORTS & SERVICES (FCESS)

 FCESS and the Family Resource Center hosted an open gym event at Evergreen Sports Gym in May. Twelve families attended with children from newborn to age four. The children (and moms) were seen were running, climbing, jumping and laughing with joy.

FAMILY SUPPORT & RECREATION

Family support provides numerous opportunities for individuals to explore recreational activities such as swim lessons, music lessons, camperships and adaptive sports (horseback riding, biking, skiing, or rock climbing and more).

 Our Conway team hosted an ice cream social for families. From make-your-own sundaes and ice cream-related team building activities, to corn hole, it was a great opportunity to gather and connect with families. (June '23)

ADVOCACY

- NHS Board member, Family Support Advisory Council member, parent and advocate, Carrie Duran provided important testimony in Concord on the State Budget bill.
- NHS hosted three in-person legislative learning sessions with candidates for the N.H. House of Representatives and Senate. Family members, home care providers, Family Support Advisory Council members, and staff met with the candidates, shared their personal experiences and advocated for the need to increase State Medicaid rates to support the direct support professional workforce.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

Service delivery staff are the heart and soul of our agency. They strive to support individuals to be contributing members of their community, provide guidance to be successful in employment situations and make it possible for an individual to live independently in their own home.

We work with employers to understand the following benefits with working with individuals with mental health and/or developmental disabilities.

- Access to talent: By focusing on skills rather than stereotypes, you access an untapped pool of talent.
- **Increased innovation**: Employees with diverse experiences have different approaches to problem solving.
- **Increased engagement and retention**: Employees who feel included have higher levels of loyalty and enthusiasm.
- **Better reputation**: Customers value companies that show a real commitment towards inclusion.
- **Benefits for everyone**: Everyone benefits from an inclusive workplace, not just those with a disability.

The developmental services supported employment team completed two separate trainings this year; a 40-hour training and certification program through the Association of Community Rehabilitation Educators and a training program through the Community Rehabilitation Program.

A Message from our President and CEO

Thinking about the obstacles that Northern Human Services has faced in recent years, and the achievements that occurred despite those obstacles, gives us reason, once again, to acknowledge and thank our staff. Over the past year we navigated the end of a global pandemic and public health emergency while facing the challenges of a national work force shortage. We implemented initiatives to address retention and recruitment and this year we were able to accomplish some of our bigger goals.

With the unanimous support of the Board of Directors, we addressed many issues identified by a group of employees who serve on the Joy at Work Committee. We increased the mileage and staff appreciation fund allowances, issued retention bonuses and adjusted the compensation scale across-the-board which increased starting salaries for all positions. These efforts have had a positive impact on retention and the turn-over rate has declined. We now need to focus on recruitment; no easy task in the current workforce environment. Workforce recruitment and retention will continue to be a major concern in the coming year.

Constant change and challenges are predictable when you consider the work that Northern Human Services does. In the past two years, mental health services and developmental services have undergone numerous changes that our employees have had to navigate and operationalize. The mental health team successfully implemented many new programs in January 2022, including Critical Time Intervention, Supported Housing and a complete change to our emergency service delivery system; now referred to as Mobile Crisis/Rapid Response. Our developmental services team has been in the midst of an unprecedented change to its delivery system and has been preparing for those changes. They have been unrelenting in their commitment to continue delivering the best possible services while focusing on our mission and, therefore, the individuals we serve.

We are so grateful for our dedicated staff whose work allows the delivery of crucial services that help to improve the quality of life for those we serve. We appreciate all of our employees who keep the wheels of Northern Human Services turning in order to assist and advocate for people in living meaningful lives.
